# **Headteacher's Comment:**

This week most classes have been studying history for their main topic. I didn't study history at school after what was the equivalent of Year 9 and really feel I missed out. This is perhaps one of the reasons I find learning about and teaching history now so interesting. You learn so much about the past but also about how past events shape our current lives. One of the many reasons I love visiting London is that all around you is 1000 years of history. You can walk from the Tower of London built by William the Conqueror nearly a millennium ago, past Shakespeare's Globe recreated as it was in Tudor times to modern day buildings such as The Shard. History in front of your eyes.

Walking around school this week has been the same kind of historical journey. Here is a short example from Key Stage 2. Year 3 are studying the Romans. If you haven't seen the Roman Day photos on twitter yet, check them out; A Roman centurion was with us for the day. I learnt that much of the food we take for granted that we grow here like apples and pears were originally brought over by them. I then popped my head into Year 4 and Viking helmets were being discussed. Next, I went into Year 5 and they were talking about Henry VIII and his wives before moving on to Queen Victoria and comparing the impact both monarchs had on our country. Who had the biggest impact, Henry or Victoria?

My final port of call was Year 6 who were learning about the local history of Brentwood. They were able to make links to their previous studies (Henry VIII would come hunting out this way and the town is on the Roman road from Colchester to London) as well as learn about Brentwood's more modern history. I discovered a map which showed where bombs in WWII fell and the map clearly showed one landing in my road.

The beauty of our history curriculum is that it is very much enquiry based. Children don't just learn facts. They compare historical sources, look at evidence and use it to answer a question e.g. the Henry or Victoria question above. It really helps them to develop a much deeper understanding and become historians who want to keep learning about the past as they go into secondary school – a love of learning for life.
